

## WHY SKILLED BIRTH ATTENDANTS MATTER

Skilled Birth Attendants Improve Maternal and Newborn Survival

MOST MATERNAL AND NEWBORN DEATHS OCCUR IN THE FIRST 24 HOURS AFTER BIRTH,1 AND 99% ARE IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES.



APPROXIMATELY 800 WOMEN DIE EVERY DAY FROM PREVENTABLE CAUSES RELATED TO PREGNANCY AND CHILDBIRTH.<sup>2</sup>

In 2012, 40 million births in developing regions were not attended by skilled health personnel.3



## SAVE MILLIONS OF LIVES EACH YEAR

BY INCREASING THE NUMBER OF WELL-TRAINED AND SUPPORTED SKILLED BIRTH ATTENDANTS IN THE 73 COUNTRIES WHERE MOST MATERNAL AND NEWBORN DEATHS OCCUR.4

A skilled birth attendant (SBA) is a midwife, physician, obstetrician, nurse or other health care professional who provides essential and emergency health care services to women and their newborns during pregnancy, childbirth and the postpartum period.






